



ABOUT THE PROPOSED CORE VALUES

Last spring, the Church Council invited members to attend two sessions with Charlene J. Smith, a member of the Evangelism Team for Local Church Development and Renewal with the United Church of Christ. We began with prayer and Bible study. We were asked to name the things we like about First Congregational Church of Twinsburg. What is our history? What are our strengths? How do we see God's Spirit working through our church now and toward the future? In those sessions, many lists and ideas emerged. And the following proposed core values were named: 1- Open to all people 2- Faith 3- Tradition 4- Compassion 5- Outreach 6-Spiritual Core 7-Strong family ties.

Last fall, in response to our expense in painting the church, accessibility needs and our desire to state our mission as a faithful church in Jesus Christ, the Stewardship Committee and the Trustees created a Vision/Mission Task Force. This Task Force would work with the data compiled in the two sessions with Charlene J. Smith and the information received from a Conference consultant, Nancy Ackley, about assessing the need and appropriate timing of a capital campaign. One of the tasks was to describe the Core Values named above. This description was taken to the Trustees and Stewardship Committee. The Trustees added further to this description. The Core Values are helpful to describe who we are now and to discern the direction the church is moving. (See Page 2)

Naming Core Values helps us to understand and interpret all our efforts, the mission projects we choose, and why we are a strong and vital church inspiring the financial and active support of members and friends.

Will Our Children Be Stewards?

Adults: Are we attending to the spiritual formation and practical instruction of our children, youth and young adults as Paul did with young Timothy? Are we respecting and encouraging their discipleship and leadership? Are we tuned in to their sincere faith? *Youth and young adults:* Do you know the gift of God that is within you? Are you good stewards of your friends, your money, your stuff? Do you want to change the world?

As centers of hope and transformation, local churches will cultivate the life of the spirit, and the spirit of generosity, of all stewards in the Household of God and assist parents in their awesome responsibilities.

So how is it that we can individually be stewards to our children? I have found that the best way to teach children is to lead by example. Often times when children are young, they are at their most impressionable stages in life. They look at their idols, peers, parents and others who influence them. We see it through the clothes they wear (or want to wear), the music they listen to, the way they act themselves, how they treat others and how they treat themselves. It is important that we ourselves be good mentors to our children. Be a steward to our children. Take the time to learn from our children and see how we may be doing as teachers. Feedback is important. We may think that we are sending one message but it may be received as another.

It may help us to reflect back to when we were children. What is it that we remember being good? What about the bad? What do we remember about the Church and how it impacted our lives as a child? How has the Church changed? How has the world changed? Here is a quote from the book, *The Godbearing Life* that I leave with you. I found it to be insightful.

“Adolescents are looking for a soul-shaking, heart-waking, world-changing God to fall in love with; and if they do not find that God in the Christian church, they will most certainly settle for lesser gods elsewhere... So will we.”¹

Hebrews 12:1(NIV) *Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles, and let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us.*

2 Timothy 4:7 (NIV) *I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith.*

You may or may not know that I began running a few years ago. It has become a big part of my life, something I rely on both for my physical and mental health. In my most recent race there were over 600 participants, with a wide variety of ages and abilities. When I run, especially when I'm by myself, my mind often wanders to distract myself from the effort. During this last race, I was feeling philosophical and thought about how everyone was running, or walking, the same route to the same finish line, each with their own ability and each for their own reasons. I thought about how that race parallels our life as Christians and our church life. There was even a man juggling as he ran, just as we juggle so many things in our busy lives as we work towards our goals. Paul wrote about the challenge of the race towards the goal, life in Christ. Believe it or not, I really did think about that during the race, but it beats thinking about sore muscles.

We could think of the common goal(s) at the First Congregational Church of Twinsburg to reach out and serve others as grow in our faith and service for God. We each have the opportunity to share our talents and proceed at our own pace. As church members, we come in all ages and sizes, each with unique abilities, but we can all race toward the same finish. As Paul said, we have to fight the good fight, or do what we can to the best of our abilities. So it doesn't matter if your talent is crocheting a prayer shawl, greeting a visitor at church or baking cookies for coffee hour. All good efforts made in God's sight for the good of the church help move us toward a common goal. There are a lot of people that do regular jobs that help this church run more smoothly and efficiently. Many of these little things people do seem small by themselves, but help us all "fight the good fight." So my thanks to all that run with perseverance, fight the good fight and keep the faith.

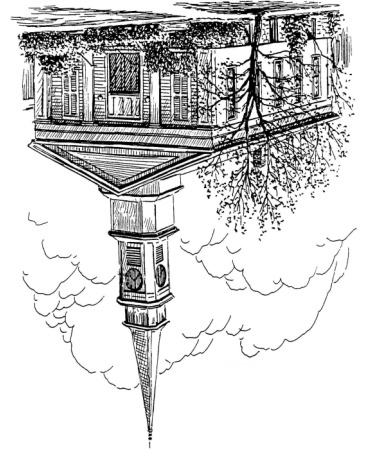

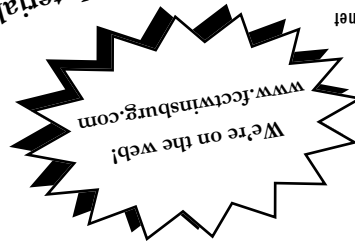
